## **BOARD CHAIRMAN WEYGANDT TO ADDRESS RURAL LINCOLN ADVISORY GROUP**

Chairman Robert M. Weygandt of the Placer County Board of Supervisors will address the Rural Lincoln Municipal Advisory Council Monday, Nov. 21 to give an overview of a proposal to build a regional wastewater treatment system based in Lincoln.

The meeting will take place at 7 p.m. in Mount Pleasant Hall, 3333 Mt. Pleasant Road, in Lincoln.

Under the proposal, a pipeline would be built to convey wastewater from Auburn and North Auburn to Lincoln's treatment plant.

On Dec. 6, the Board of Supervisors will hold a special meeting to decide how to meet federal and state standards for treating wastewater from North Auburn. The board will weigh two options: upgrading the county's existing wastewater treatment plant in North Auburn or participating in construction of the regional system.

For several years, Placer County has been exploring the regional approach with the cities of Lincoln and Auburn under the umbrella of the Placer Nevada Wastewater Authority. At the same time, Placer County has worked on plans for upgrading and expanding its existing plant.

City of Lincoln officials have offered to design, construct and operate the regional system. Lincoln's wastewater treatment plant meets federal and state standards and has room for expansion.

Chairman Weygandt is serving his 5<sup>th</sup> four-year term on the Board of Supervisors. He represents the 2<sup>nd</sup> District, which includes Lincoln, Sheridan, part of Rocklin and part of western Roseville.

During the Nov. 21 meeting, advisory council members also will hear a presentation from the Placer County Sheriff's Office on state laws regarding marijuana cultivation, dispensaries, collectives and cooperatives.

The Rural Lincoln advisory body is one of 14 municipal advisory councils located throughout the county. Commonly known as MACs, they advise the Board of Supervisors on issues of public interest in unincorporated areas. They are charged with gathering public comment on a range of topics, including land use, public works, recreation, law enforcement and public health and safety.
